BOMB SCARE SCATTERS WEDDING GUESTS

Bomb attacks on four hotels throughout Southern Ireland last Saturday evening caused wide-spread damage and conern in Galway as three

hotels were evacuated.

A voice claiming the name "Captain Black" of the U.F.F. telephoned the Irish Press office in Dublin Irish Press office in Dublin stating there were bombs in the Gresham Hotel, Dublin; Royal George, Limerick; Great Southern Rosslare; the Great Southern Torc Hotel, Killarney, and the Salthill Hotel in Galway. The message was immediately relayed to the Gardai who contacted Eglinton Street station. The caller said the bombs would go off at 6 p.m.

ould go off at 6 p.m. At 4 p.m. Mr. Eamon de Loughry from Kilkenny married former Miss Catherine White, New-Catherine White, New-astle Avenue, Galway, in the Cathedral and they rived at the Salthill lotel for their reception t 5.30 p.m. As the weather was so fine the wedding warty decided to have heir sherry on the lawn. Drinks had just been servd when Gardai arrived and warned the hotel must

he cleared.

As guests were leaving the Murray family concentrated on the wedding and a neat plan of cooperation between hotels was arranged. Wedding guests were moved up to Mr. and Mrs. Kearns Rock barton Park Hotel while the Dunleavy family prepared the Sacre Coeur Hotel for the dinner. Salte cleared. Hotel for the dinner. Salthill Hotel staff served the dinner at the Sacre Coeur. In the meantime the In the meantime the Salthill Hotel was exten-tively searched ten times but nothing was found. Bombs had exploded in the other four hotels as stated by "Capt. Black."

At 10 p.m. the all-clear was given at the Salthill, the wedding guests re-turned for their dance and not one of the hundred residents checked out that night. The Gardai believe that the bomber simply did not make his target as it was obviously pre-arranged he would

Both the Corrib Great Southern and the Great Southern Hotel Eyre Square received telephone

Square received telephone warnings. The hotels were evacuated but thankfully nothing was found.
"Capt. Black" warned the Irish Press that the bombings were in retaliation for the shooting of business men in the North. He said if these shootings continued there would be no warning next time.
